Our Friends are all active members of the following divisions

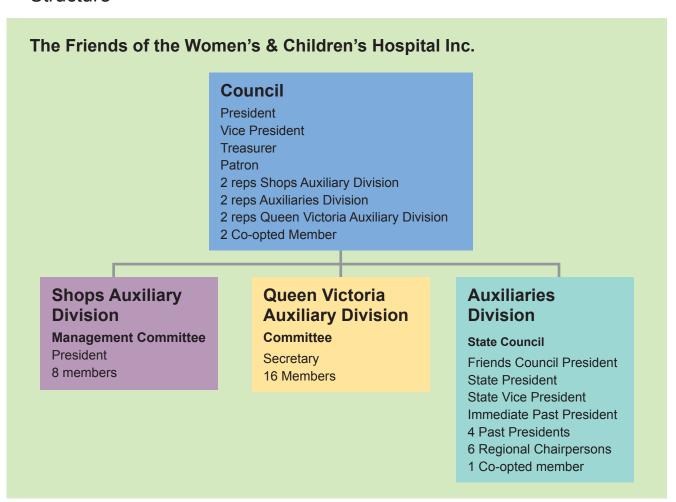
- > Auxiliaries Division

Report on Activities



Business Manager's Report

The impact of COVID-19 continued to provide various challenges for Friends and our dedicated members over the first 8 months of this reporting period. Once again, the shops suffered the biggest impact with Rainbows finally allowed to open on the 6th April 2021.

The financial ramifications from this will continue to influence the decisions of the Friends Council for some time.

The financial position for Friends as at 30 June 2021 is a net deficit of (\$57,109).

Total income for 2020/21 was \$669,481 with donations to the Women's and Children's Health Network (WCHN) of \$180,485 for this financial year.

The amount donated includes \$68,310 for the Screening Audiometers and \$52,624 for a Paediatric Ventilator. Both items were selected for purchase from the 2019/20 allocation of funds.

For the full list of equipment selected and purchased during the year, please refer to the New Acquisitions by the WCH section of the report.

The Friends Council were pleased to be in a position to allocate \$50,000 from funds raised this financial year towards the purchase of a Cough Assist Machine and an additional 8 Phototherapy Units for the new Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU). These items will be purchased and invoiced to Friends during the 2021/22 financial year.

Additional projects funded by the Friends include the Person and Family Centred Care Passion Projects and the Friends Fellowship Program.

A total of \$2,615 was allocated to these projects. Due to the impact of COVID-19, the Friends Council agreed to provide an extension to projects approved in the 2019/20 financial year, 3 of these projects are still to be completed. A summary of all projects will be included in next year's Annual Report. Funding for new projects, will also be

suspended for the 2021/22 financial year and reassessed for the following financial year.

Once again administrative costs (include staff wages) for the Friends office, have been invoiced to Friends throughout the year by the WCH. Due to the requirement to correctly calculate these costs for the full financial year the final invoice for Friends wages, goods and services (June 30th 2021) has not been paid within this reporting period.

All financial reporting obligations were completed during the year ensuring Friends maintains its Charity status.

The Friends licence details appear on the Consumer and Business Services website www.cbs.sa.gov.au.

Consolidation of the two listed ABN's under the Friends Incorporation occurred during the year. This was a recommendation by the Friends Auditor to reduce the ACNC reporting requirements, eliminate confusion and consolidate financial reporting. The second ABN (97868681980) was listed against the Shops Division and was necessary when the shops and Friends reported separately.

The Queen Victoria Auxiliary Division continued their process of selecting equipment to support the Women's and Babies Division of the WCH. The items donated are also listed in the New Acquisitions by the Women's & Children's Hospital section of the report.

I was pleased to be able to attend the Auxiliary Divisions Regional Conferences for Regions 10 and 11, however due to the reopening of the shops and recruitment requirements I was not able to attend the other conferences. I look forward to recommencing my travels in the future and always welcome the opportunity to meet with the country members.

Redesigning the Friends website was a major focus for the office during this reporting period. The aim was to design and develop an intuitive and inspirational website that will have a friendly and consistent user experience across all browsers and devices. A website that can be maintained by members and staff with the primary objectives of

- > Generating an increase in new and recurring donations
- > Increasing awareness of Friends
- > Recruiting new members and volunteers and
- > Aligning the site with the Friends Growth Strategy.

I thank Emilia Chignola from MTMM for her expertise, commitment and enthusiasm in volunteering her time to lead this project.

I thank my colleagues from the Friends office Sonia Davies (Friends Coordinator), Eva Kalmar (Administrative Support and Office Volunteer) and Mark Russell (Shops Coordinator) for their flexibility and dedication to the Friends.

This was booked with Open Gardens South Australia and as the nominated charity, the QVA will receive 50% of the gate-takings. Devonshire Tea is to be served and a trading table is planned. To enhance profits, committee members are enthusiastically potting suitable plants and securing raffle donations.

In December, the QVA Auxiliary looks forward to completing their year with a Christmas lunch booked in The River Cafe at the Weir.

We thank each of the sub-committee's who have worked diligently to organise their events during these difficult times. The QVA acknowledge and thank Pauline Linke for her commitment as President. We thank Andrew for his support of our committee. Thank you also to Jo, to Eva, and to Sonia.

Interim President's Report

It has been another challenging year for the volunteer shops at the WCH. Vics Coffee Shop was able to trade through most of 2020 but Rainbows remained closed until April 5th 2021. Many of our long-term volunteers resigned during 2020 so there was an urgent need to recruit new people to staff our rosters across both shops. While this recruiting drive has been moderately successful, both shops still need more volunteers to maintain a roster which meets our everyday needs. Currently, we have 88 volunteers working across both shops.

While our takings are not yet up to pre-COVID-19 levels, we have made some strong gains since re-opening this year. The Barista Coffee machines in both shops have proved to be a great asset. The daily takings from coffee sales have bolstered not only our overall numbers but also have attracted a greater flow of traffic into and through the shops. Mark Russell, our Shops Coordinator, has played a huge role in the success of the coffee sales and has been tireless in his efforts to train volunteers in the use of the machines. We now have a large number of regular customers who enjoy or coffee.

Another challenge for the Shops going forward is to comply with the regulations proposed by the SA Health Network for healthy eating in all SA Hospitals. This has meant that all food and drinks sold in the Hospital are rated according to their healthy content and the Shops must comply with these regulations. So far we have managed to comply but there may be stricter guidelines to follow in the future which will have an impact on our sales and therefore our profit.

During the year we were disappointed to receive the resignation of Hetty Gardenier, the President of the Shops Committee. Hetty took on the role of President in 2018 and also represented the Shops Committee on the Friends Council during that time. For 8 years she was a volunteer in Vics coffee shop where she worked mainly as a Team Leader. We thank her most sincerely for her outstanding contribution.

As a Shops Committee, we acknowledge the contribution made by all our volunteers. Their willingness to give their time and use their skills to aid in our mission to raise funds for the Hospital is to be applauded. They are an amazing group. One of our volunteers, Jodie Hoffman, has made a very significant contribution to the shops since Rainbows re-opened. She has worked tirelessly to ensure that both Shops have workable rosters each day. Her efforts have been acknowledged by Jenny Fereday, Executive Director Nursing and Midwifery WCHN.

Thanks also to Donna Coombe and Sandra Harrington, our volunteer Treasurers, who have been busy implementing a new software system which will be of immense benefit to our organisation in the future. It will allow them to manage our finances much more easily and efficiently and provide us with up to date information on our transactions.

Mark Russell, our Shops Coordinator, has had his contract extended for a further two years. Mark has used his technical expertise to update many of the procedures we rely on for the Shops to function efficiently as well as training our volunteer baristas and register operators.

The Shops Committee has agreed to support Andrew in his quest for Rainbows to remain open in a slightly limited capacity over the 2021 Christmas period this year. While most volunteers will take a three week break as normal, it would seem that there is enough volunteer support for trading to continue during this time.

While it has been a difficult period for all businesses, the Shops can be very proud of their donation of \$245,000 to the Friends of the WCH for the year. It is an amazing contribution and well appreciated by the Friends Council, who we know will use it to benefit the WCH and its consumers

On behalf of the Committee and our Shops volunteers, I would like to thank Andrew for his continued support and his dedication to recruitment of new volunteers, Mark for his daily commitment and professional input, Sonia, Friends Coordinator, who we welcome back from her seven month secondment and Eva, whose happy disposition is uplifting.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2021

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

In the opinion of the Officers of the Association, the Association is not a reporting entity. Accordingly, the report is a "Special Purpose Financial Report" that has been prepared solely to meet the requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act (SA), the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 and the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Regulation 2013.

The financial report covers the Friend's of the Women's and Children's Hospital Incorporated as an individual entity. The Friend's of the Women's and Children's Hospital Incorporated is an association of volunteers that support and fundraise for the hospital community. The principal place of business of the Friend's of the Women's and Children's Hospital is 72 King William Road, Adelaide, South Australia.

TheFriend's of the Women's and Children's Hospital Incorporated has not accessed whether these special purpose financial statements comply with all the recognition and measurement requirements in the Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statement has been prepared in accordance with the following Accounting Standards and other mandatory professional reporting requirements:

The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

Accounting Policies

a) Revenue

Revenue recognition

Operating grants, donations and bequests

When the Friend's of the Women's & Children's Hospital Inc received operating grant revenue, donations or bequests, it assesses whether the contract is enforceable and has sufficiently specific performance obligations in accordance with AASB 15.

When both these conditions are satisfied, the association:

- identifies each performance obligation relating to the grant;
- recognises a contract liability for its obligations under the agreement; and
- recognises revenue as it satisfies its performance obligations.
 - Where the contract is not enforceable or does not have sufficiently specific performance obligations, the association:
- recognises the asset received in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable accounting standards (eg AASB 9. AASB 16, AASB 116 and AASB 138);
- recognises related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer); and
- recognises income immediately in profit or loss as the difference between the initial carrying amount of the asset and the related amount.

Accounting Policies (continued)

If a contract liability is recognised as a related amount above, the Friend's of the Women's & Children's Hospital Inc recognises income in profit or loss when or as it satisfies its obligations under the contract.

Interest income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

b) Income Tax

The Association is exempt from income tax pursuant to the Income Tax Assessment Act.

c) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

d) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The Association is registered for GST purposes, with a GST registration number 46 162 206 835.

For the Association all revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the balance sheet are shown inclusive of GST.

e) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The council evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the association.

f) Key Judgements

(i) Performance obligations under AASB 15

To identify a performance obligation under AASB 15, the promise must be sufficiently specific to be able to determine when the obligation is satisfied. Council exercises judgement to determine whether the promise is sufficiently specific by taking into account any conditions specified in the arrangement, explicit or implicit, regarding the promised goods or services. In making this assessment, Council includes the nature/ type, cost/ value, quantity and the period of transfer related to the goods or services promised.

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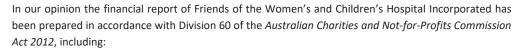

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

We have audited the financial report of the Friends of the Women's and Children's Hospital Incorporated, which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2021, the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, and the Committee of Managements' declaration.



- (a) giving a true and fair view of Friends of the Women's and Children's Hospital Incorporated's financial position as at 30 June 2021 and of its financial performance for the year then ended; and
- (b) complying with Australian Accounting Standards to the extent described in Note 1, and Division 60 the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Regulation 2013.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report* section of our report. We are independent of the registered entity in accordance with the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110 *Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Emphasis of Matter - Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling Friends of the Women's and Children's Hospital Incorporated's financial reporting responsibilities under the ACNC Act. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

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The Committee of Management of Friends of the Women's and Children's Hospital Incorporated are responsible for the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and have determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 to the financial report is appropriate to meet the requirements of the ACNC Act and the needs of the members. The Committee of Managements' responsibility also includes such internal control as the Committee of Management determine is necessary to enable the preparation of a financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial report, the Committee of Management are responsible for assessing the Friends of the Women's and Children's Hospital Incorporated's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Committee of Management either intend to liquidate the Friends of the Women's and Children's Hospital Incorporated or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

The Committee of Management are responsible for overseeing Friends of the Women's and Children's Hospital Incorporated's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial report as a whole is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of the financial report.

As part of an audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit.

We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the registered entity's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by responsible entities.

Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the registered entity to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial report, including the disclosures, and whether the financial report represents the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with the Committee of Management regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

Other Matter

Cash donations and receipts are a significant source of fundraising revenue for the Friends of the Women's and Children's Hospital Incorporated. The Friends of the Women's and Children's Hospital Incorporated has determined that it is impracticable to establish control over the collection of cash donations prior to entry into its financial records. Accordingly, as the evidence available to us regarding fundraising revenue from this source was limited, our audit procedures with respect to cash donations and receipts had to be restricted to the amounts recorded in the financial records. We therefore are unable to express an opinion on whether the recorded cash donations of the Friends of the Women's and Children's Hospital Incorporated are complete.
